## Our Relationship with Government

## **Key Scriptures**

Romans 13:1-7 Let every soul be subject to the governing authorities. For there is no authority except from God, and the authorities that exist are appointed by God. <sup>2</sup> Therefore whoever resists the authority resists the ordinance of God, and those who resist will bring judgment on themselves. <sup>3</sup> For rulers are not a terror to good works, but to evil. Do you want to be unafraid of the authority? Do what is good, and you will have praise from the same. <sup>4</sup> For he is God's minister to you for good. But if you do evil, be afraid; for he does not bear the sword in vain; for he is God's minister, an avenger to execute wrath on him who practices evil. <sup>5</sup> Therefore you must be subject, not only because of wrath but also for conscience' sake. <sup>6</sup> For because of this you also pay taxes, for they are God's ministers attending continually to this very thing. <sup>7</sup> Render therefore to all their due: taxes to whom taxes are due, customs to whom customs, fear to whom fear, honor to whom honor.

**Titus 3:1** Remind them to be subject to rulers and authorities, to obey, to be ready for every good work,

**1 Timothy 2:1-4** Therefore I exhort first of all that supplications, prayers, intercessions, and giving of thanks be made for all men, <sup>2</sup> for kings and all who are in authority, that we may lead a quiet and peaceable life in all godliness and reverence. <sup>3</sup> For this is good and acceptable in the sight of God our Savior, <sup>4</sup> who desires all men to be saved and to come to the knowledge of the truth.

**1 Peter 2:13-17** Therefore submit yourselves to every ordinance of man for the Lord's sake, whether to the king as supreme, <sup>14</sup> or to governors, as to those who are sent by him for the punishment of evildoers and for the praise of those who do good. <sup>15</sup> For this is the will of God, that by doing good you may put to silence the ignorance of foolish men -- <sup>16</sup> as free, yet not using liberty as a cloak for vice, but as bondservants of God. <sup>17</sup> Honor all people. Love the brotherhood. Fear God. Honor the king.

**Key Point:** We need to show a calm, qualified respect for those in authority, whether they represent our views or not.

## TALK IT OVER

Start talking: Pick a conversation starter for your group.

• If you ever received a speeding ticket, what was that experience like? How did you feel?

Start thinking. Ask questions to get your group thinking.

- In Romans 13:1-7, what is Paul's main command for believers in relation to government? What are his reasons for this command?
- What does he say is the "job description" of the civil government? Do you feel like there are certain roles government should have, but that Paul doesn't address them here?
- In Titus 3:1 and 1 Tim 2:1-4 does Paul add anything to what the roll of government is, or how Christians are to relate to it?
- In 1 Pet 2:13-17, does Peter agree with Paul? Does he add anything?
- According to Acts 5:12-29, what are legitimate reasons for civil disobedience?

Start sharing. Choose a question to create openness.

- How similar is your attitude toward the authorities with the one Paul commands here?
- Do you tend to have too high a view, or too low a view, of the authorities God has established over you?
- Are there any ways in which you are being called to courageously disobey an authority in order to obey God?
- In Sunday's message we were told we need to show a calm, qualified respect for those in authority, whether they represent our views or not. How are you giving the authorities your calm, qualified respect?

Start doing. Commit to a step and live it out this week!

• Pray through 1 Tim 2:1-4 for specific authorities this week.
